The Park is an excellent place to become acquainted with the Gualala River and its estuary filled with wildlife, wildflowers, and lots of interesting history.


- -Visit the Serge Posts

The Serge Posts

Built by the Sakha, indigenous people of Siberia, who were horse breeders, the posts had both practical and symbolic meanings. A serge was built outside each family's home & represented a Tree of Life. They were carved and erected during the Sakha Cultural Festival in 2014. See link: Serge Posts

Center, look down at the pathway
to see outlines of several whale
species seen from our coastline.
The Park has also designated a
place in which to watch for
passing whales. April is a great
month to see mother Gray
Whales returning north with their
calves.

Trails


The trails will take you on a circular journey along the Gualala River Estuary, through the meadows and hedgerows and above the beach and Pacific Ocean. Bring your camera or nature journal to capture some of the park's unique natural beauty.
